# MINOR IN LATIN AMERICAN AND LATINX STUDIES

## **Program Learning Outcomes for the Minor in Latin American and Latinx Studies**

Upon completing the minor in Latin American and Latinx Studies, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate familiarity with interdisciplinary area studies research.
- 2. Interpret the historical, cultural, and political dynamics that comprise a specific region selected by the student for in-depth study.
- Apply critical perspectives on legacies and ongoing forces that are local and global in scope from the field of Latin American and Latinx Studies.

### **Requirements for the Minor in Latin American and Latinx Studies**

Students pursuing the minor in Latin American and Latinx Studies must complete:

- A minimum of 6 courses (18 credit hours) to satisfy minor requirements.
- A minimum of 4 courses (12 credit hours) taken at the 300-level or above.
- A maximum of 2 courses (6 credit hours) from study abroad or transfer credit. For additional departmental guidelines regarding transfer credit, see the <u>Policies</u> (p. 3) tab.

While taking courses in a language other than English is not required for the minor, study abroad and coursework in languages spoken in Latin American and Latinx communities other than English are highly encouraged (e.g. Spanish, Portuguese, French, or Indigenous languages).

The courses listed below satisfy the requirements for this minor. In certain instances, courses not on this official list may be substituted upon approval of the minor's academic advisor, or where applicable, the Program Director. (Course substitutions must be formally applied and entered into Degree Works by the minor's <u>Official Certifier (https://registrar.rice.edu/facstaff/degreeworks/officialcertifier/)</u>). Students and their academic advisors should identify and clearly document the courses to be taken.

Of the 6 courses (18 credit hours) required for the minor, a minimum of 4 courses (12 credit hours) must be taken at the 300-level or above. Please note that not all courses listed to fulfill requirements will be offered every academic year. Courses at the 100-level will not fulfill minor requirements.

#### **Elective Requirements**

Students must complete a total of 5 courses (15 credit hours) from the following department approved electives. At least 4 courses (12 credit hours) must be taken at the 300-level or above. 1 course (3 credit hours) may be taken at the 200-level (or above). Courses at the 100-level will not fulfill minor requirements.

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# Policies for the Minor in Latin American and Latinx Studies

#### **Program Restrictions and Exclusions**

Students pursuing the minor in Latin American and Latinx Studies should be aware of the following program restriction:

As noted in <u>Majors, Minors, and Certificates (https://ga.rice.edu/undergraduate-students/academic-opportunities/majors-minors-certificates/</u>), i.) students may declare their intent to pursue a minor only after they have first declared a major, and ii.) students may not major and minor in the same subject.

#### **Transfer Credit**

For Rice University's policy regarding transfer credit, see <u>Transfer</u> <u>Credit (https://ga.rice.edu/undergraduate-students/academic-policiesprocedures/transfer-credit/</u>). Some departments and programs have additional restrictions on transfer credit. The Office of Academic Advising maintains the university's official list of <u>transfer credit advisors (https:// oaa.rice.edu/advising-network/transfer-credit-advisors/</u>) on their website: <u>https://oaa.rice.edu</u>. Students are encouraged to meet with their academic program's transfer credit advisor when considering transfer credit possibilities.

#### **Departmental Transfer Credit Guidelines**

Students pursuing the minor in Latin American and Latinx Studies should be aware of the following departmental transfer credit guidelines:

- No more than 2 courses (6 credit hours) of transfer credit from U.S. or international universities of similar standing as Rice may apply towards the minor.
- Requests for transfer credit will be considered by the departmental Director of Undergraduate Studies (and/or the program's official transfer credit advisor) on an individual case-by-case basis.
- Courses taken at another university must be equivalent in required reading, writing, research and testing, as well as classroom hours, of a Rice course. Regarding subject matter, however, there does not have to be an equivalent course in the Rice course offerings, unless the student requires distribution credit.
- Rice students planning to study at a foreign university must also obtain pre-approval from the Rice Study Abroad Office.
- Transfer credit received via the articulation of approved exam credit, such as advanced placement (AP) credit, international baccalaureate (IB) credit, or A-level credit will not be considered towards minor requirements.

#### **Distribution Credit Information**

The determination of distribution credit eligibility is done initially as part of the <u>new course creation process</u> (<u>https://registrar.rice.edu/facstaff/</u> <u>courseprocess/</u>). Additionally, as part of an <u>annual roll call</u> (<u>https://</u> <u>registrar.rice.edu/facstaff/distribution\_credit/</u>) coordinated each Spring by the Office of the Registrar, course distribution credit eligibility is routinely reviewed and reaffirmed by the Dean's Offices of each of the academic schools.

Faculty and leadership in the academic schools are responsible for ensuring that the courses identified as distribution-credit-eligible meet the criteria as set in the <u>General Announcements (https://ga.rice.edu/ undergraduate-students/academic-policies-procedures/graduationrequirements/#text</u>). Students are responsible for ensuring that they meet <u>graduation requirements (https://ga.rice.edu/undergraduate-</u> students/academic-policies-procedures/graduation-requirements/#text) by completing coursework designated as distribution-credit-eligible at the time of course registration.

Distribution courses from the Department of Modern and Classical Literatures and Cultures are broad in theme and scope and provide students with a substantial inquiry into literature, art, media, history, thought, and/or politics, including specific national traditions, linguistic contexts, and historical periods. Such courses involve a broad and often interdisciplinary spectrum of knowledge, providing students with the tools for thinking critically about the formation of modern culture, its colonial past, and its national and linguistic traditions from antiquity to the present.
