

# MINOR IN BEHAVIORAL MEDICINE AND HEALTH RESILIENCE

## Program Learning Outcomes for the Minor in Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience

Upon completing the minor in Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience, students will be able to:

1. Explain psychological, biological, and social mechanisms linking stress, behavior, social processes, and context to health, disease, and resilience across the life course. (*Mechanisms and Biobehavioral Processes*)
2. Apply quantitative, qualitative, and/or mixed methods to design, analyze, and interpret behavioral and population health data. (*Methods and Data*)
3. Describe and compare health disparities and determinants at individual, interpersonal, organizational, and structural levels, and explain how these contexts influence vulnerability and resilience across populations and life stages. (*Disparities, Determinants, and Resilience Contexts*)
4. Synthesize evidence across mechanisms, methods, and social context in a supervised, health-related research experience that culminates in a research product. (*Research Integration*)

## Requirements for the Minor in Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience

Students pursuing the minor in Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience must complete:

- A minimum of 8 courses (24-28 credit hours, depending on course selection) to satisfy minor requirements.
- A minimum of 4 courses (12 credit hours) taken at the 300-level or above.
- A maximum of 2 courses (6 credit hours) from study abroad or transfer credit. For additional guidelines regarding transfer credit, see the [Policies](#) (p. 2) tab.

The courses listed below satisfy the requirements for this minor. In certain instances, courses not on this official list may be substituted upon approval of the minor’s academic advisor or, where applicable, the Program Director. (Course substitutions must be formally applied and entered into Degree Works by the minor’s [Official Certifier](https://registrar.rice.edu/facstaff/degreeworks/officialcertifier/) (<https://registrar.rice.edu/facstaff/degreeworks/officialcertifier/>)). Students and their academic advisors should identify and clearly document the courses to be taken.

### Footnotes and Additional Information

- <sup>1</sup> PSYC 485 *UNDERGRADUATE SUPERVISED RESEARCH* is a variable credit hour course. Students must enroll for a minimum of 3 credit hours (and may enroll for a maximum of 6 credit hours) of PSYC 485 in order to fulfill minor requirements.
- <sup>2</sup> Students must enroll in the section of PSYC 485 *UNDERGRADUATE SUPERVISOR RESEARCH* designated as the Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience (BMHR) minor Capstone section. Instructor permission is required to enroll. Additionally, students must be placed with an approved faculty mentor. If a specific instance of PSYC 485 is approved to fulfill minor requirements, the approval must be formally applied and entered into Degree Works by the minor’s Official Certifier.

## Course Lists to Satisfy Requirements

### Elective Requirements

To fulfill the remaining Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience minor requirements, students must complete a total of 3 elective courses (9 credit hours) from the following two categories as listed below. At least 1 course (3 credit hours) must be selected from the **Mechanisms and Processes: Individual, Neural, Biobehavioral** category, and at least 1 course (3 credit hours) must be selected from the **Populations and**

**Systems: Social, Organizational, Structural** category. The remaining 1 course (3 credit hours) can be selected from either category.

### Footnotes and Additional Information

<sup>1</sup> PSYC 480 *ADVANCED TOPICS* is an advanced topics course. Therefore, this course only counts toward the Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience minor when the topic of the course is health-relevant. If a specific instance of this course is approved to fulfill minor requirements, the approval must be formally applied and entered into Degree Works by the minor's Official Certifier.

## Policies for the Minor in Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience

### Program Restrictions and Exclusions

Students pursuing the minor in Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience should be aware of the following program restriction:

- As noted in [Majors, Minors, and Certificates](https://ga.rice.edu/undergraduate-students/academic-opportunities/majors-minors-certificates/) (https://ga.rice.edu/undergraduate-students/academic-opportunities/majors-minors-certificates/), i.) students may declare their intent to pursue a minor only after they have first declared a major, and ii.) students may not major and minor in the same subject.

### Transfer Credit

Students pursuing the minor in Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience should be aware of the following program transfer credit guideline:

- No more than 2 courses (6 credit hours) of transfer credit from U.S. or international universities of similar standing as Rice may apply towards the minor.

### Opportunities in Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience

The minor in Behavioral Medicine and Health Resilience connects students with faculty research groups in Psychological Sciences, Sociology, Anthropology, and Economics, with the Institute of Health Resilience and Innovation (IHRI), and with partners across the Texas Medical Center and greater Houston. Opportunities are supervised, skills building, and aligned with each student's goals. Representative opportunities include:

- IHRI speaker series and podcast, including attendance, hosting responsibilities, and preparation of brief written or audio materials.
- Community engaged projects such as the annual Fifth Ward health fair, where students assist with planning, data collection, and evaluation briefs under faculty supervision.
- Health-related research teams that use surveys, experiments, qualitative interviews, biomarkers, human factors observations, or program evaluation, often with training in research ethics, data handling, and dissemination of results.

These experiences support the minor's emphasis on behavioral mechanisms, health resilience, and health equity, and often serve as the setting for students' Capstone: Health-Related Research Experience
